

The director of the Australian National Gallery, Betty Churcher, opened Canberra's fourth Antiquarian Book Fair yesterday with strong words of support for books as superb vehicles for art and information.

"Over the past 200 years most art-ists of importance from Picasso to Matisse, from Toulouse-Lautree to William Morris have worked on the book, and the book remains for us the most tidy, the most portable and


