Caucus calls jobs summit

A worried Labor Caucus is planning to hold its own jobs summit just one day after that of the Prime Minister, Paul Keating, on youth unemployment.

Backbenchers want to impress on Mr Keating how concerned they are about the deteriorating unemployment situation. They are expected to call for greater effort by the Government.

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Hewson on attack

Opposition Leader John Hewson has blamed the union movement for contributing to youth unemployment. Dr Hewson said the unions had failed to eliminate youth training wages, leading to rising unemployment.

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MP's inheritance

NSW Liberal backbencher and solicitor, Brad Hazzard, said last night he was appalled by the raising of questions about his inheritance of a substantial estate from an elderly woman whose legal affairs he handled.

The MP, who was executor of the will and its sole beneficiary, said the implication of the questioning was that he had behaved unethically and with impropriety.

'Big Quake' fear

Californians are living in fear Sunday's earthquakes could be the beginning of the Big One. The quakes measured 7.4 and 6.5 on the Richter scale.

Some scientists said the shocks increased the pressure on the San Andreas Fault just outside Los Angeles.

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Yugoslavia

UN officials said they were still

unable to guarantee the safety of flights into Sarajevo's airport yesterday, the deadline set by the UN as it considered using force to fly in relief supplies.

Serb forces said they had handed over Sarajevo's airport to UN peacekeepers. But fighting had blocked French relief flights.

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Ramos President

Fidel Ramos, 64, who participated in the restoration and defence of the democracy he once helped abuse, becomes President of the Philippines today in the country's first peaceful transfer of power in 26 years. He will take his oath at noon, succeeding Corason Aquino.

Recovery delay

Australia's largest company, BHP, does not expect to see significant signs of economic recovery until early in 1993.

The forecast, made yesterday by BHP executives, follows the issue last Friday of BHP's annual results to May 1992.

BHP's chief executive John Prescott said that "had something been done earlier" than the Government's One Nation statement in February to encourage infrastructure investment, the problem would not have been so great.

All Blacks

New Zealand's embattled All Blacks have dismissed moves to cite two of their players as an "absolute red herring".

NSW Rugby Union officials initiated action in the wake of the torrid NSW-All Black clash in which seven state players were injured, five of them so badly they had to be replaced.

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Pressure on Krabbe

Katrin Krabbe, cleared of doping charges, has just 10 days to ensure a place in the German team for next month's Barcelona Olympics.

The double world champion has been assured by German officials that her name will go forward in the sprint relay squad when the Olympic team is named today. But Krabbe has only until July 10 to clock some faster times to make sure of being able to compete in the individual events.

Bid to drop war crimes charges

ADELAIDE: Defence counsel at Australia's second European war crimes hearing have sought to have charges dropped against defendant Mikolay Berzowsky because of his ill-health.

Lawyer Michael David, QC, told the Adelaide Magistrates Court yesterday that he had written to the Department of Public Prosecutions calling for charges to be withdrawn.

He said Berzowsky, 78, had severe vascular problems that could be life-threatening.

Berzowsky, an Adelaide pensioner, is charged with being knowingly involved in the murder of 102 Jews near the Ukrainian village of Gniwan in 1942.

Mr David has had no response from the DPP and Magistrate David Gurry proceeded with a half-day hearing where cross-examination of the first overseas witness, Mikhail Raykis, continued.

Mr Raykis was 11 years old at the time of Berzowsky's alleged offences.

The hearing continues today. Berzowsky is the second of three Adelaide pensioners accused of European war crimes.

The first, Ivan Polyukhovitch, 76, is standing trial in the South Australian Supreme Court from next Monday charged with murdering six people in the Ukraine in 1942.

Heinrich Wagner, 68, will face a commitment hearing in August on charges of having murdered 20 people and of taking part in the murder of 104 people in Ukraine between 1942 and 1943.

Highlights in history on this date, June 30:

- 1574: William of Orange persuades Holland to open dikes to hinder Spanish siege of Leyden.
- 1652: England declares war on the Dutch.
- 1818: Female orphans in Sydney removed to new orphan school near Parramatta.
- 1845: Anglo-French expedition sent to Madagascar against local ruler.
- 1857: Dutch barque Koning Willem II wrecked at Gulches Bay, South Australia: 16 die.
- 1876: Serbia, under nationalist Jovan Ristic, declares war on Turkey.
- 1902: Agreement negotiated in London providing for a Royal Navy squadron to be stationed in Australia, its cost subsidised by this country.
- 1913: Second Balkan War opens with Bulgaria attacking Serbia and Greek positions.
- 1917: All Lutheran day schools in South Australia closed by Act of Parliament.
- 1930: Britain recognises independence of Iraq.
- 1934: Nazi purge begins in Germany, with Adolf Hitler getting rid of hundreds of political and military leaders.
- 1947: Qantas Empire Airways taken over by the Commonwealth.
- 1950: US President Harry Truman orders US troops stationed in Japan to help Republic of Korea repel North Korean invaders.
- 1956: Leeward Islands Federation dissolved to enable islands to enter Caribbean Federation.
- 1960: Independence of Congo Republic proclaimed under President Kasavubu, with Patrice Lumumba as Prime Minister.
- 1960: National Service training officially ended in Australia: remaining trainees discharged.
- 1964: UN military operations in Congo end.

1965: Ceasefire signed between India and Pakistan.

1971: Three Soviet cosmonauts, in space for more than three weeks, found dead when their spacecraft lands.

1975: Queensland Labor Senator Bert Milliner dies. Premier Bjelke-Petersen appoints anti-Whitlam Albert Field as replacement.

1976: US spacecraft's photographs of Mars show that planet once sustained abundant and rapidly flowing water.

1987: USSR passes laws designed to reverse nation's economic decline.

1990: USSR resumes oil shipments to Lithuania one day after that republic's parliament agrees to suspend declaration of independence.
